We are thrilled to share the heartwarming success story of our 2022-2023 journey together. Our 45th year as an organization was truly record setting! Your generosity has fueled a remarkable impact on the valuable work United Way of Sumner County (UWSC) provides. Together we exceeded all fundraising, allocation, and advocacy goals for the year!

Based on what was raised during the 2022-2023 fiscal year, we were able to fulfill 88% of the grant requests for the 2023-2024 grant year and will be supporting 35 cherished partner agencies in Sumner County! Incredibly, another \$23,000 of in-kind contributions were distributed to help off-set costs for our partner agencies. Your contributions empower these organizations to continue their vital health and human service programs, providing crucial support to those who need it most.

UWSC understands the importance of advocating on behalf of those who need services, as well as those who provide services. One way we do this is through our ALICE research and reporting. United for ALICE provides us a way to distribute information showing an unbiased picture of financial hardship in our community, which in turn results in action to get involved. Earlier this year, we rolled out two additional reports from United for ALICE; our Veterans Report and People with Disabilities Report. We hope you will take a moment to learn more about those in the following pages.

Our commitment to the community and to our partner agencies includes providing a much-needed resource referral service, 2-1-1. Last year, our 2-1-1 (24/7) call service took over 2,000 calls from people in Sumner County needing resources from housing assistance to mental health services, from food pantries to medical care and many other needs. New this year, we added the Tennessee Benefit Kitchen to our menu of resources. The Benefit Kitchen is a free and confidential screener anyone can use to learn more about their eligibility for federal, state, and local public benefits in Tennessee. Hundreds of families in Sumner County have already completed the screener and had the opportunity to apply for benefits.

All of these successes underscore the power of our collective efforts and shared commitment to meeting the diverse needs of our community. As we reflect on the achievements of the past year, we want to extend our deepest gratitude to each one of you for your support. Together, we're creating a lasting impact on our community, and we're excited to continue this journey of positive change with your ongoing support.



# Advocating for ALICE

As of our 2022 report, there were 27,000 households in Sumner County who were earning just above the Federal Poverty Level but make less than what it costs to live here. We call them ALICE: Asset Limited Income Constrained Employed.

United Way of Sumner County is working hard to advocate for ALICE by continuing to share the results of our ALICE studies with business, government, and community leaders so as to bring attention to the needs of these families.




In 2022, two more installations of the "ALICE in Focus" series were released with research based on 2019 data.

The second in the series, "ALICE in Focus: Disabilities" found that having a disability — whether apparent or non-apparent, physical or cognitive — can be a substantial barrier to financial stability.

As of 2019 there were 28,135 disabled Sumner County residents with 53,960 disabilities. 52% (almost 15,000) were living below the ALICE threshold, meaning they made less than what it costs to live here and were struggling to make ends meet.



# Advocating for ALICE




Even though government programs like Supplemental Security Income (SSI) are intended to provide financial assistance to people with disabilities who have limited income and resources, the criteria are so limited that our report found that only 10% of people with disabilities in Sumner County were receiving SSI payments. (To be eligible, applicants cannot have assets greater than \$2,000 for an individual and \$3,000 for a married couple - a level that has not been updated in nearly 40 years.)


While the eligibility criteria for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP, formerly food stamps) is higher, applicants still cannot earn more than 130% of the FPL to qualify, leaving **only 20% of Sumner County disabled residents** receiving the benefit.

The third and final segment of the "ALICE in Focus" series focused on Veterans and found that, though they've served and sacrificed for our country, many live paycheck to paycheck as they struggle to afford basics.

As of our 2022 report, there were 11,864 veterans living in Sumner County. A total of 27% of them were living under the ALICE threshold with less than 1% (32) living in poverty and the remaining 26% (3,200) living in ALICE households.



# Advocating for ALICE



As a result of medical advances, military personnel are now more likely to survive a significant injury in combat, thereby increasing the number of veterans living with service-related disabilities. The report found that veterans with a disability are more likely to struggle financially than those without.

In Sumner County, 40% of veterans reported having a disability. Of those without a disability (7,082), none were living in poverty and 23% (1,620) were ALICE. However, for those with a

disability, just under 1% (32) were living in poverty, but another 32% (1,548) were ALICE leaving 33% (1,580) living under the ALICE threshold.

The study found that the majority of Sumner County veterans (91%) own their own homes and only 9% live in renter households. This is likely because home loans available through the Veterans Benefits Administration make it easier for qualified veterans to purchase a home because they require no down payment and offer low interest rates and limited closing costs. However, the report also found that approximately 3% of Sumner County veterans were owner housing cost burdened and another almost 3% were rent burdened, meaning that they pay more than 35% of income on rent or mortgage plus utilities, taxes, and insurance. This means that 6% of Sumner County veterans were more likely to experience housing insecurity and were at greater risk of becoming homeless. It is also worth noting that 90% of veterans in Tennessee are male, yet Sumner County has no permanent homeless shelters for males.
